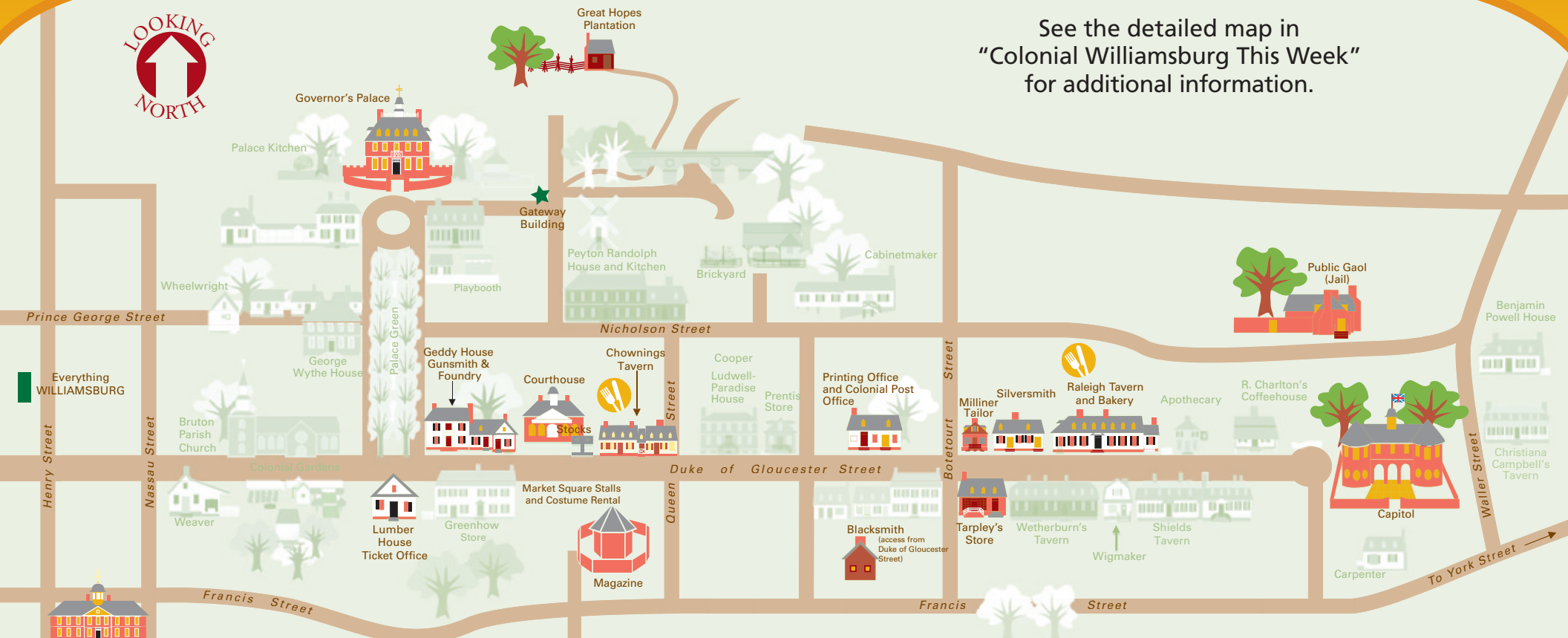

**Great Hopes Plantation**—A visit to this working farm gives you a feeling for how most Virginians lived more than 200 years ago. Take a walk across the footbridge from the Visitor Center and turn off the path to step back in time.



**Gateway Building and Kid's Corner**—Stop by to find out what is happening in town and try your hand at one of the self-guided activities just for kids.



**Children's Orientation Walk** 10:45 and 11:45 a.m. daily—Meet at the Gateway Building to join us for this 30-minute walking tour where we will point out all the family-friendly things to do while in Williamsburg. Along the way, you will learn about colonial children and their families.



**Palace Maze and Cellar**—Get lost and found in the maze at the back of the Palace gardens. Step carefully on the steep stairs to the cellar.



### **James Geddy House and Gunsmith/Foundry**

(allow 25 minutes)—Discover more about the life of Mr. James Geddy Jr., a silversmith by trade who lived in this house

with his wife and five children. The whole family helped in the attached shop. The trades of gunsmith and founder are carried on in the shop behind the house.



**Magazine** daily (allow 30 minutes)—An army doesn't really march on its stomach. Soldiers need weapons, powder, tents, uniforms, and many other things. See where many of these important supplies were stored.



**Stocks and Pillory beside the Courthouse** (Bring your camera and allow 5 minutes)—Lock 'em up! Who will be first in the stocks and pillory? The kids or mom and dad?



### **The Colonial Williamsburg Art Museums**

Open 10 a.m.–7 p.m. daily (allow 60+ minutes)—Housed under one roof, the DeWitt Wallace Decorative Arts Museum and

Abby Aldrich Rockefeller Folk Art Museum have a variety of experiences for children of all ages. There is even a special audio tour for teens. Printed family guides are always available.



**Blacksmith Shop**—With forge, anvil, hammer, tongs, rasps, and files, blacksmiths in Williamsburg fashioned items from iron and steel for household use and for their fellow tradespeople to use in their work.



**Printing Office and Bindery**—The printer prepares newspapers, books, broadsides, and more on his press. The binder will cover any book, large or small, but the most popular book has no printing at all! Blank books were used for keeping records, diaries, ledgers, and other personal or business needs.



**Milliner, Mantua Maker, and Tailor**—Clothing is always a necessity. Drop by the Margaret Hunter Shop and see the latest fashions being made.



**Silversmith**—The 18th-century silversmith was thought of as someone akin to a sculptor. Both had to know how to shape their materials with artistic talent, taste, and design.



**Gaol** (Allow 15 minutes)—Arg! In the early part of the 1700s Blackbeard's pirates awaited trial in the cells of this "strong, sweet prison."

During the Revolution, the gaoler and his family lived in the attached house to tend the prisoners of war and runaway slaves housed here.

## **HISTORIC AREA ANIMALS**

There are animals of all sorts around the city. Many of them are part of a Colonial Williamsburg's special effort to save rare breeds of domestic animals. You can find them in the pastures, paddocks, yards, and streets around the Historic Area. Keep your eyes open and see how many of them you can find!

## **TAKE HOME SPECIAL MEMORIES**

**Carriage Rides**—Take a ride around the Historic Area, weather permitting. Space is limited; purchase tickets early.

**Costume Rental Program**—Dress like a colonial kid and experience Williamsburg from a different perspective. Rentals are available daily at the *Outdoor Booths on Market Square* and *WILLIAMSBURG Revolutions* at the Visitor Center.

**Colonial Post Office**—Quill pens, ink, ink wells and sealing wax. Letters and postcards are hand-canceled with a reproduction 18th-century Williamsburg postmark.\*

**Tarpley's Store**—Toys, games, candies, soaps, period clothing, hats, and jewelry for children of all ages.\*

**Everything WILLIAMSBURG**—Find all sorts of items to add to your memories.\*
